The positive functions of crime

Learning objectives

At the end of this activity you should be able to:

- Identify the positive functions of crime and deviance according to functionalists.
- Use examples of crimes to illustrate these functions.
- Evaluate the usefulness of functionalist views of the positive functions of crime.

Your task is to analyse some media crime reports in order to identify the positive functions of these crimes as reported.

- 5. Write a paragraph to evaluate the usefulness of the functionalist view of the positive functions of crime using your class examples to illustrate your argument.
